#### Administrator/Clerk updates:

- Completed the Personnel Policy Manual review with Ms. Hozalski. It will be reviewed by Mr. Strickler and Mr. Tkach next.
- Railroad update Ms. Ziemba reached out to Carolyn Bick. She was going to be meeting with Mr. Latta's office, but Ms. Ziemba has not heard back from Ms. Bick.
- Mr. Mead told the commissioners that he had reached out to his contacts about the railroad issue. They have expressed to him that until after November 20<sup>th</sup>, everything is in a holding pattern. November 20<sup>th</sup> is when they will make the decision as to whether or not they will go on strike. Mr. Mead told the commissioners that 2 of the 5 major unions on the railroad have already shot down the current contract, so they are not sure what is going to happen. The contacts told Mr. Mead to reach out to them again after the 20<sup>th</sup> and they would do everything in their power to assist us.

- Mr. Boose noted there is a Firefighters Association meeting Wednesday at 7:00 p.m.
- Mr. Brady will be riding with the Ohio State Patrol on Veterans Day.

# **Commissioner Boose updates:**

- Tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m. there is a Firelands Forward board meeting.
- Mr. Boose forwarded an e-mail containing a white paper that was done regarding workforce development. It talks about 4 different organization across the county and the good things they are doing. One of the organizations mentioned is Firelands Forward.
- Meeting with Kristen Cardone from MHAS this afternoon.
- Wednesday, Mr. Boose has a meeting with Ms. Minor and Ms. Ziemba at JFS.

# **Commissioner Wilde updates:**

- Mr. Wilde had a question about next Thursday. Mr. Boose will be leaving that afternoon, but Mr. Wilde wanted to try to touch base with the Mayors before he left. Mr. Wilde asked if they could have the meeting at 11:00 a.m. and asked if there was anything scheduled. Ms. Ziemba told them the only thing she had on the calendar was county project updates at 9:15 a.m., but she thought there may be a potential item for executive session that day and they may want to move that time up to 10:00 a.m. Mr. Brady thought that was on the following Tuesday. Ms. Ziemba agreed. Mr. Boose thought they needed to review the budget on Thursday, November 17<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Wilde felt they would not have the much to review for the budget that day and asked if they could schedule the meeting with the mayors at 11:00 a.m. Mr. Wilde thought that 15 minutes would be plenty of time for the meeting with the Mayors.
- Waiting on one more thing from SAFEbuilt. Ms. Ziemba said we have sent a resolution to the State Auditors to request a fund. Ms. Ziemba sent it to Megan Bursley, who uploaded it to the State Auditors site. It was uploaded last Friday morning, but Ms. Ziemba has not talked with Ms. Bursley as to the outcome. Mr. Boose asked about the office space. Mr. Wilde said it was cleared out and he was going to have the carpets shampooed and the walls painted. Mr. Wilde also thought they would be using a desk from the peer center.
- Mr. Brady told the commissioners that he was voted the vice-president of the Energy Committee.
- SAFEbuilt
  - Ms. Ziemba told the commissioners that she just received a response from Ms. Bursley, who attached the approval from the Auditor of State for a Commercial Building Department Fund. Ms. Bursley said they could create the fund, but do we need it right now or do we need to put it in the interim budget for approval, which would begin January 1<sup>st</sup>. The commissioners felt it should be set up January 1<sup>st</sup>. Ms. Ziemba said it would go in the budget now.
  - Mr. Wilde said once we approve everything we will send invoices out and should get most of the initial fee back. The communities would like the invoice first of the year so they can put it in their budget.
- Mr. Boose thought we would need to put some startup money in the fund to pay the first bill before the cities give us their money to help pay for it. Ms. Ziemba stated they would have to decide whether they wanted to pay that one-time fee out of the new fund or the general fund. Since the cities and villages are paying it back in, it would go back to that fund, once you move money to that special fund, it can't come back out and wouldn't go back to the general fund. Mr. Boose stated that either way they do that it needs to be budgeted for the beginning of the year. Mr. Wilde asked if it would be better to pay the fee out of the general fund because the payments would go to the general fund. Ms. Ziemba told him yes because then you would have a balance in the special fund that you wouldn't be able to use for anything. Ms. Ziemba asked if that would need to be paid when we sign the contract. Mr. Wilde and Mr. Strickler told her no. Mr. Strickler was told they would be okay if we did not pay that until the beginning of January.

## At 9:34 a.m. Art Mead, EMA – 2024 Solar Eclipse discussion:

Mr. Boose wanted to confirm the date. Mr. Mead Said that he has been conducting a lot of research and told Mr. Boose the date of the eclipse is **April 8, 2024.** Mr. Mead stated that we are on the totality line or center line of the process

Mr. Mead told the commissioners there are only two EMA directors on the State's task force. Mr. Mead and the EMA Director from Crawford County. The state is planning on doing a tabletop exercise and getting all their resources together. Mr. Mead is of the opinion that we will be doing a lot of the stuff on our own. Unless the governor declares a disaster, which he may do at that time. It would open up funding for things that are needed.

The Eclipse involves 15 states. It starts in New Mexico, comes up through Texas and ends up going all the way up through Maine. There is a 128-mile section of Ohio that will see some part of the eclipse. It will go from the western edge of Toledo to the Eastern edge of Cleveland, the edges will see a part of it. Because this is in April, the sun is a little further away and the moon closer, so it will be more of a total block out and will be very impressive to see. The moon will actually block out 99% of the sun for a 4-minute time frame. The next eclipse similar to this in Ohio will be in 2444. The centerline of the eclipse will actually start to see the eclipse at 1:53 p.m. on that date. It will be done around 4:30 p.m. that day. The totality will happen around 3:08 p.m.

The EMA is concerned with how many people will be coming to Huron County to observe this. Mr. Wilde asked what day of the week this was on and was told Monday. They discussed people coming in the weekend before. Mr. Mead has researched this and found that some of the local hotels are already half full and a lot of the campgrounds are already three quarters to fully booked for this event. This includes Huron, Erie and some in Sandusky County. Mr. Mead talked to the Erie County EMA Director and was told that Kalahari has already had a lot of phone calls inquiring, but still has a lot of rooms. A lot of hotels don't book out that far, but some do and this is what we are dealing with right now. Mr. Boose thought we might want to have a discussion with the Fair Board about the 2 campgrounds they have, as far as planning ahead.

#### TUESDAY

Mr. Mead said what he has done so far for Huron County is to have meetings with law enforcement chiefs, fire chiefs and some conversations with smaller groups. He is trying to schedule some time with the Chamber of Commerce because he wants them to be involved with this process. When he had talked to the Chamber about 6 months ago, they had some good ideas and wanted to handle the business side. Then he could focus on the emergency management aspect of this event.

Mr. Boose wanted to keep a list of any activities that will be happening. He is talking about public events. Mr. Mead forwarded a link to Eclipse.ohio.gov. It is Ohio Department of Natural Resource's website for the eclipse. If there are any large events in Ohio, they are trying to put them on the site. There will be an event at Summit Motorsports the weekend before the eclipse and that will be put on the state website. Mr. Meade felt we should do something on a local site as well and thinks if we can give people places to go and things to do, they may be able to contain some of the chaos that may ensue.

Mr. Mead said in April the Coast Guard will be busy because even though it will be chilly on the water, the chances of clouds being out over Lake Erie in April are slim to none because usually the cold air on the lake pushes the clouds ashore. So, there will be a lot of people on boats that want to see the eclipse.

We have a lot of interstates that are coming in this general direction. If we were not in the totality line, it would not be such a pressing issue. Toledo, Columbus, Cincinnati and Dayton are already trying to capitalize on places to stay and things to do. Mr. Boose stated he wants tourism as much as anybody, as long as it is organized and done well. Mr. Boose challenges our economic development, visitor's bureau and chambers to do that and push it out. He did not want the commissioners to be the lead.

Mr. Mead's responsibilities are to the first responders and the emergency response to the community for the residents. Columbus has one version and are saying we will have 2 ½ to 3 ½ times our population come here. Mr. Mead does not know how to calculate that number and everything that he is reading dictates that we will have folks come here because a lot of the people that watch this won't want to go to the big tourist sites. They are going to want to camp and party all weekend. Mr. Mead told Mr. Boose that he has already discussed this with the fair, but needs to discuss in more detail. He would also like to talk with New London's Reservoir, Willard's Reservoir and Norwalk's Reservoir. Even though they say no camping allowed, folks are going to camp where they can and they will not be able to control it.

Mr. Wilde hoped there might be some extra funding, but Mr. Mead said he can't count on that. He has reached out to some of his vendors as far as fuel bladders and will be setting them up strategically throughout the county, so first responders have access to fuel. They will be responsible for paying for their own fuel, but we are having problems with diesel and gas now, he can only imagine what it is going to be like if we have that many vehicles come through this area. Mr. Boose suggested we keep a list of any money spent towards this event in case there is an opportunity to be reimbursed for expenses.

Mr. Mead said that Aries radio communications, cell phones and other items in his office which would be used to communicate with first responders as well as the community, are things they need to consider. Mr. Mead has still not gotten a solid number for cell phones, but did get someone from FirstNet to give him a rough number of their capabilities, but it is always changing. FirstNet has added 5 towers to the county over the last 18 months. Mr. Mead has no place in the county that he does not get 5G. The problem is that they still can't tell him the capability. Mr. Mead has already put in a request for a FirstNet tower to be put in downtown Norwalk, which will assist first responders, so they will have that extra capability. But if you are not on First Net, it will not help very much.

Mr. Mead has reached out to local schools and was told that Western Reserve will not be having school that day. The Superintendent talked about renting out parking spots and bleacher spots as a fund raiser, but Mr. Mead is not sure if he was joking about this or serious. Mr. Boose thought that this was a good way for people to take advantage of this and reiterated that someone needs to keep a list of all the events going on around the area.

Mr. Mead said that when he had discussed this with Kelly Lippus from the Chamber, she had suggested we put together a website for the eclipse. Mr. Mead told the commissioners that we currently have 3 charging stations for electric vehicles in the county and he has a feeling that we will have more than 3 electric vehicles come into the county for this. Another item to think about is people trying to find charging stations for their cell phones and they can't access their cell phone, that is something they should probably publish as well.

Mr. Mead is hoping that people come in and have a good time, don't get to crazy or overrun anything. But we have to prepare for the worst. All of the hotels in Erie County stay open year-round now, so that will help offset some of our flow, however, it also scares him a little because everyone will come in on Monday morning, so Route 250 will be slammed. Erie County will see some of it, but not as much as we will. The Collins/Wakeman area will be hit really hard because that is where the centerline goes through. It also goes through downtown Norwalk. The back side of this is that people will be camping and portable toilets will become a priority. The trash after the fact will become a priority as well. We will have the ugliness that comes with a group of this size.

#### TUESDAY

Mr. Boose noted that there are a lot of campgrounds in Erie County and Mr. Mead told him that he found out there were even more in Sandusky County. Mr. Boose said that Cedar Point's campground is large, but they are not usually open at that time of year. Mr. Mead knew that there have been some conversations with Cedar Point to see if they would even open up partially for that weekend. Possibly something like a Hallow weekend, so they could draw some of the crowd for the weekend before. Kalahari is gearing up for it also.

Mr. Mead is getting weekly calls to keep him updated. Our counterparts to the south, in the Dayton area, have already reached out and said their places are already starting to book up.

Mr. Mead has concerns that the local hospitals may not be able to handle a major event when the population has swelled so much. Mr. Brady thought that would be a good question for Ottawa County since they have that situation every weekend in the summer. Mr. Mead said he has been out there working that kind of event for the EMS and it is absolute mayhem. They bring in outside resources for mutual assist. The problem is we will not be able to do that because all of the counties around us are somewhat involved with this process.

Mr. Mead gave an example of EMS squads being split between Huron, Sandusky and Erie Counties. North Central is split between all of them. Willard Fire runs EMS, Firelands has 3 EMS squads and Citizens has 2. When you think about it, we have about 8 or 9 squads to use. If we have that many people and we start to get busy our first responder fire departments are going to have to start stepping up and doing first responder stuff.

Mr. Mead has had conversations with ODOT to try to control the flow of traffic down Route 18. So, when the event is over, they can have everything go west towards Route 20 to help push everything down the road to the bypass using 2 lanes in the same direction. Mr. Wilde asked about the round-about on 18 and was told it would not be in yet. Mr. Mead had discussed with ODOT if any other road projects would be going on at that time in Huron County.

This type of event has not been dealt with much and is harder to understand than tornado, flood, fire and hazardous waste events. Mr. Mead said his job is to think worst case scenario because that is what he would be dealing with, but hopes everything will go well.

Mr. Wilde said that he has a tower on one of his downtown building and would gladly let the first responders use it for this event. Discussed having North Coast Wireless possibly set up hot spots or something similar. Mr. Mead has a couple more meetings in Columbus about this.

Mr. Boose suggested Mr. Mead speak to his state representatives. Mr. Mead told him that Senator Manning has been twisting the arm of several people for him, but has not had much time due to the elections.

Discussed wireless communications and the fact that people do not have a land line anymore, they only have cell phones, so if wireless goes down, how do they get ahold of first responders.

Mr. Meade suggested putting a group of local Mayors together to get some ideas. Last weekend Willard had some power lines down and the hospital was concerned as to how long they would be without power. Also, Mr. Mead had to explain to people what storm mode means to the power company, which is, they are getting beat up pretty hard and will get to you when they can.

Mr. Wilde asked if they wanted to touch on the budget. Mr. Boose said he had plenty to talk about.

## At 10:05 a.m. the board recessed.

## At 10:20 a.m. the board resumed regular session with Budget discussion.

- Mr. Boose mainly looked at 2 accounts and stated when money is tight, what you really need to look at is capital projects and whether you can delay them or not. There are a lot of items in the 021/Capital Improvements that we have to do and a few things we don't have to do. Mr. Boose got it down to around \$450,000.00 so we could look at the big picture.
  - The next biggest one was 099/Transfer.
    - $\circ$  We have to pay bonds.
    - Victims Assistance pay every year.
    - $\circ$  Benefit Funds maybe not.
- Permanent Improvements -
  - Mr. Boose thought this could be greatly reduced. Last year we had \$1.5M and Mr. Boose feels we could lower it to \$.5M. That is without going into a detailed look at permanent improvements.
  - $\circ$  May be able to not do anything with broadband infrastructure.
- 099/Transfer Out could be lowered to \$1.5M. Mr. Boose is not comfortable with that number for the year, but for the interim. If we add \$2M to the \$19,674,000, the total is \$21,674,000.
- Mr. Wilde clarified the other one-half million came from 021/Capital Improvements. Mr. Boose stated this was a significant cut. Mr. Brady questioned the \$450,000 in 021/Capital Improvements.
- Mr. Boose said there was another amount that needed to be added to that \$1.5M to take it close to \$2M. It will be at \$2M when we add in the transportation startup money. He did not know how we

could get away from some of those costs. This will take it up to \$2M for 099/Transfer Out and \$500,000 for 021/Capital Improvements.

- \$21,674,000 should be 500,000 more.
- Mr. Boose said he was looking at the big picture and said Ms. Ziemba reminded him they had done salary increases in interim last year. Mr. Boose was okay with salary increases, but did not think it could be done in interim. Last year was unique. Normally they wait to see what the final budget is because final budget usually goes up, so there is more money to talk about.
- Even though Mr. Boose talked about cutting Transfer, Permanent Improvements & Capital Projects, he reminded the other commissioners there is a fund out there he wanted to bring up. Ms. Ziemba told Mr. Boose the Medicaid Sales Tax Transition fund was Account 708. Mr. Boose told Mr. Brady up until about 5 or 6 years ago counties used to be able to tax Medicaid, such as nursing homes, it was a sales tax on Medicaid. It was a deal made when the Federal Government quit giving certain Medicaid dollars. They then said Medicaid could be taxed to make up for some of the money we were losing locally. It didn't work out in the long run. About 6 years ago the Federal Government said that they would not give the state Medicaid money anymore if they charged sales tax. The state did not know how that would affect local governments, so they supplemented our budget a little bit the first year. In Huron County, we didn't know what was going to happen with this money, so we set it aside in a reserve account, which is the #708 Account. It is not part of a sustainable budget and we can't count on salary increases based on that account. However, when you take a sizable amount of dollars out of permanent improvements and we have a long- and short-term plan now through B&G, with lots of one-time money. When we come to final budget, we have that money. If total revenues are down, it might be time to use that money. Hopefully final budget numbers will be higher than interim. Then we can look at those to start talking about salary increases and some other things, also to pay union contracts. Even with significant cuts to Permanent Improvements in the interim budget. We will be able to do some things, like the HVAC in the Administration Building and can continue to do some of those things without bonding. We can still continue to do those things because we have money set aside. We are well past the transition years for that now. We worked through and set a budget that we could be okay with. Even though we are talking about severely cutting the capital projects in the interim budget.
- If we didn't have that money, Mr. Boose said he wouldn't be comfortable making the cuts he suggested. If we can get down to a lower number for the interim budget than last year without making cuts to any departments, other than one or two departments that already had raises and other things included in their budget. Mr. Boose felt this approach would allow us to do the things we need to do.
- Mr. Wilde thought the Medicaid money has been sitting there, and based on what is going to happen, he thought that could sustain us for another year.
- Mr. Brady liked the idea and thought last year's budget had things put in, but we didn't spend them this year because it wasn't the right time because some things were going to cost more than anticipated. Mr. Brady did not have a problem using this fund, especially if it was just going to sit there. While we want to be frugal and fiscally responsible for the people's money. It doesn't do a lot of good for the buildings to be dilapidated or falling down while the money sits there.
- Mr. Boose said the good news is we have a short term and a long-term plan for our capital improvements. He felt we need to dig that back out to update it and decide what we can do and not do. Mr. Wilde stated we can add on or subtract from it.
- Mr. Boose said he had thought on this and tried to figure out the numbers. We know the price of gasoline and office supplies are up and our employees' salaries are low. Luckily, we don't have to go back to 2010 and make significant cuts. Mr. Boose feels that because of our conservative spending over that last 6 years and setting money aside, not knowing if we would need or use it, we got by. Mr. Boose feels it is always better not to bond or borrow money if you do not need to. We were fortunate in those years that we didn't. Mr. Boose stated he is not willing to cut peoples salaries or staffing in order to not bond. If we need to bond to get some of the needed capital improvements done, then we can look at that in final budget.
- Mr. Boose said he was very concerned after looking at the numbers last week. He tried to look at the big picture before finalizing. Mr. Boose thought Ms. Ziemba had a lot of questions and she did.
- Ms. Ziemba asked about the break out of how he had gotten to the numbers he mentioned. Mr. Boose will sit down with Ms. Ziemba and work through the numbers, then report back to the rest of the board. Ms. Ziemba said after she got together with Mr. Boose and he explained his numbers, she will show him what we have commitments for already.

At 10:45 a.m. Terry Boose moved to enter into Executive Session ORC 121.22 (G)(1) to consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion, or compensation of a public employee or official, or the investigation of charges or complaints against a public employee, official, licensee, or regulated individual; ORC 121.22 (G)(3) a conference with an attorney for the public body concerning disputes involving the public body that are the subject of pending or imminent court action; and ORC 121.22 (G)(4) preparation for, conducting, or reviewing negotiations or bargaining sessions for public employees, concerning employee compensation or other terms and conditions of employment.
