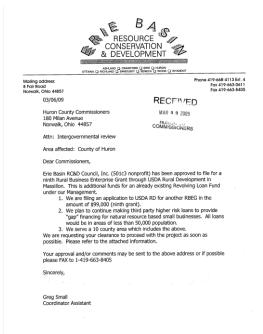

<u>At 9:40 a.m.</u> The board recessed to take pictures of the Christie Lane advocate officers. <u>At 9:42 a.m.</u> regular session resumed

Gary Bauer reported on the Family and Children First Council meeting and reported on the government funding and stated that all the professionals at the meeting were depressed at what is happening in the governor's budget.

Discussion was had in regards to OSU Extension budget cuts and how they will affect each county.

Larry Silcox discussed reports that he has seen recently about California which was the highest rate at 22% and Elkhart Indiana came in fourth so he would say that our unemployment rate last month was fourth in the country according to this report.

Mike Adelman discussed the budget and the sales tax which is within the auditor's estimate but behind last year at this time by a little over \$73,000. Mr. Bauer stated that the Auditor stated that he would not come back in July and roll the numbers back again because he feels that he has made the cuts that needed to be made and he said that we are up \$66,000 over the estimate. Mr. Bauer also stated that he had spoken with Kathleen Schaffer, Treasurer and the auditor agreed that the delinquent taxes are no higher than normal which is another good piece of news.

Mr. Adelman stated that the sheriff has two retirements coming for Alberts and Gadberry and the payouts there amount to \$29,609 which is about \$4,000 less than then anticipated when we asked for the number last year so that money had been set aside to move over there to cover those retirement payouts. Mr. Adelman stated that he took a look at where they might be able to save one layoff as the Sheriff had asked for, and stated that the only place that he could find it would be because of the fact that people were being laid off there would be a little wiggle room from where they had appropriated funds for health insurance and that would be in the amount of about \$20,500. This would not be needed because that the laid off people would not be on health insurance and we could use funds in that department and between that and the \$15,000 we moved there a couple of weeks ago and the pay outs for the retirement is the best that we can do. Mr. Bauer stated that the auditor maintains that we should not give the sheriff anymore funding. Mr. Adelman stated though that these funds were put in transfer out #099 for these retirements. Mr. Bauer discussed the extra non mandates that the board funds. Mr. Bauer asked the auditor if we were at a point where we need to pull these funds back before we pass the final budget and he said no not this year, but we had better keep it in mind for next year. Mr. Silcox asked if maybe we should think about cutting it even a quarter this year. Mr. Adelman stated that in terms of God's Little Critters we did cut them back the same in 2004 as every other budget. If we want to do that he is sure that Mary Beth would be fine with that and feels that if we send her a letter stating that her funding will be cut that amount she will be fine with it. Mr. Adelman stated though that he still maintains that she should receive something from the county because she is getting calls to take care of things. Mr. Silcox stated that he doesn't have a problem with it but when you look at those expenses here and there it is time to give those the same cut that we have given everyone else. Mr. Adelman stated that in regards to the sheriff's department he can call Sheriff Howard and tell him that the funds for the retirements are there and this additional \$20,500 and ask if it is going to save one layoff or not. Mr. Silcox asked if the two that are planning to retire are included. Mr. Silcox stated that he would go along with this but is also concerned about giving him more money, as he was out and talked with him and the sheriff gave Mr. Silcox his list of personnel for the jail and the road officers and why he was going to have to layoff four road officers. Mr. Silcox stated that on his way out he passed the civil office, which still have three people and he has not cut staff. Mr. Silcox stated that he wouldn't criticize the sheriff and how is running his department as it is his job, but the day that he was out there his

jail administrator had just come back from the range to get certified so that he could carry a weapon which means he is a full fledge deputy sheriff and if need be he could be used a patrol officer in these hard times and the civil office work could be divided amongst dispatchers and corrections people when they are not busy. Mr. Silcox stated that what we are doing as far as the \$20,500 is as far as he is concerned it is appropriate. Mr. Bauer asked where the money is coming from in regards to unemployment. Mr. Adelman stated that he would be a little more specific in regards to the appropriation for the health insurance between the couple of retirements and layoffs there is actually enough in that line to cover everyone that is on the insurance for this year, and we probably have about \$39,000 more in that line than what we need, but to make sure we have enough in there to cover cobra or something else he stated that he is not even thinking about taking that full \$39,000 from that line and putting it somewhere else. Mr. Bauer stated we have given them \$15,000, \$4,000 and the \$20,000 can he do anything with \$40,000.00. Mr. Adelman stated yes that saves one job. Mr. Silcox also stated that he is not happy with the idea of the sheriff stating that he is not getting funding so he will have to layoff road patrol, when he still has three people in the civil office but as stated before those are his decisions. The board agreed that Mr. Adelman can let him know about this and Mr. Bauer stated that Mr. Adelman needs to make it clear that if this funding move is made it is to save the layoff and not for anything else. Mr. Adelman stated that the board needs to target a date here to pass the budget. It was decided that the target date for passing budget is March 26, 2009.

At 10:20 a.m. the board recessed.

At 10:30 a.m. regular session resumed

Bill Duncan, Dog Warden came before the board and reported on the newest vehicle that they own having a problem with the transmission. After discussion with the county mechanic Lon Burton following report was discussed.

Assistant Prosecutor's Report

Daivia Kasper reported on the seminar for alternatives to lay offs that she and Sue Bommer attended yesterday. Ms. Kasper stated that they talked about many of the things that Huron County had talked about such as furloughs, reducing work hours, changing the health plan as far as premiums that are paid. Ms. Kasper stated that one of the things that he did say was that he felt certain that if properly prepared an agreement with your classified civil service employees to reduce hours or furloughs or something else that would affect reducing their pay could withstand court scrutiny. He did recommend that it be written up very carefully so that you would address what you are doing whether it be reduction in the rate of pay or hours the affect any type leave, such as vacation, any kind of accrual rate and whether there is any affect on seniority or anything like that. You need to write down that it is voluntary and give them an opportunity to review and at some later date have them sign it if they wish to agree or not wish to agree. Also need to know how to proceed if some employees decide not to agree etc. Ms. Kasper stated that she asked about her question of this being coercive but he thought it would with stand a court challenge if all the process was completed and make sure that it is drafted well.

At 10:46 a.m. Larry J. Silcox moved to adjourn. Mike Adelman seconded the motion. The meeting stood adjourned.
